JUDGES | THE CYCLE OF JUDGE JUDGES 2:6-3:6

The book of Judges teaches us of a turbulent time when Israel was to occupy the Promised Land. Instead of following God's direction, they did what was right in their own eyes and did evil in the sight of the Lord. They allowed the idolatry to coexist in the land that was supposed to be a place God that God was exalted. They became influence and compromised by the ungodly they lived with in the land and took their gods. This led to their oppression and what we know as the cycle of Judges. What is this cycle and what can we learn from the principles of Judges 2?

- Good examples are not <u>enough</u>, we need to <u>personally</u> <u>know</u> the Lord and teach subsequent <u>generations</u> to do the same.
- 2. When we abandon the Lord and chase after idols, we provoke a <u>righteous</u> and <u>just</u> God.
- 3. God is angry with idolatry, and <u>anger</u> and <u>love</u> are not diametrically opposed.
- 4. God shows us <u>compassion</u> in contrast to false gods that lead us to false hope, <u>temporary</u> comfort and cannot provide <u>deliverance</u>.
- 5. God will allow us to be <u>tested</u> to demonstrate to us our need for Him.
- 6. God will use difficult and painful circumstances so we can identify our <u>idols</u> and recognize our need for our <u>Deliverer</u>.
